

God's Secret Shoppers

Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares. Hebrews 13:2

I used to work in retail stores when I was a teenager, both for Nautica and Tommy Hilfiger (in the late 90's that was the place to be). Our managers used to always harp on us for customer service because we never knew when we were going to be visited by "secret shoppers." If you do not know, a secret shopper is someone the corporate office will pay to send in and act like a customer needing assistance. The secret shopper would then send a detailed review to the corporate office that would be part of the store's evaluation. If we failed to help a secret shopper, our manager would get severely reprimanded and because that sort of stuff rolls downhill, all the employees would then get chewed out. It was frustrating because anyone could be a secret shopper, you never knew who they would send. The only way to ensure we did not get a bad review was to treat everyone with the attention that a secret shopper would receive (and that is exactly what management wanted).

The author of the letter to the Hebrews reminds us that churches and Christian communities have a version of this secret shopper, angels. The author says that in neglecting to show hospitality to strangers, we would miss the opportunity to entertain God's "secret shoppers." The idea is that a church would welcome everyone like they were sent by God, so at the very least, not to neglect those who might be.

One of the tasks of the Vestry this year is to focus on hospitality and welcome, several on our hospitality task force have been looking at St. Peter's through fresh eyes asking the question – what is the experience at St. Peter's for someone visiting for the first time? Part of this process has been asking first time visitors to fill out a review answering questions. Some of the issues are out of our hands, but the one question that affects everyone in this church is – Do you feel welcomed? When a person walks in the door for the first time, much of the first impression they have of St. Peter's will be based on how they are treated and welcomed.

This is not meant to lecture (far from it) but to remind us of the high calling we all share in the ministry of welcome. It is a ministry we all share, it is more than just the job of one, it is the job of all. We may not all be evangelists, or teachers, or preachers, but we all can welcome.

We do not know why people walk in the door of St. Peter's for the first time, we do not know what might be happening in their life, we do not know if they are hurting or scared or broken. We can never underestimate how much a warm smile and a sincere welcome can mean to someone when they are going through something in their life.

God will send us his "secret shoppers" as the author to the Hebrews tells us, what would their report of St. Peter's be?

Summer Reading




Corrie Ten Boom, The Hiding Place

This book tells the story of Corrie and her family, who helped to hide Jews in Holland during WWII. Their activities were eventually discovered, leading to their arrest. One of the most fascinating parts of the book is the description of how Corrie and her sister live out their faith in the midst of the deplorable conditions of a concentration camp.



Brother Andrew, God's Smuggler

Brother Andrew is a child in Holland during the Nazi occupation and joins the army as a young man, taking part in combat in the Dutch East Indies. Having reached a very low point in his life, he is converted to Christianity, afterwards becoming a smuggler of Bibles behind the Iron Curtain. His experience of dependence upon God, as well as God's miraculous provision, is inspiring and fascinating.



David Watters, At the Foot of the Snows

This book recounts the experiences of a young American family that goes to Nepal in the late '60's to do ethnographic work for the Nepali government. They live among a remote tribe while, among other things, they translate the Bible into the local language, thereby introducing Christianity to these people for the first time. The result looks much like the book of *Acts* recapitulated in a very different setting.

QPR Training ~ Saturday, May 2 from 9a.m.-1 pm.

QPR Suicide Prevention Training is a training that anyone, in any field or walk of life, can take to learn to help save a life from suicide. QPR stands for Question, Persuade, and Refer - these are three easy steps that anyone can learn to help prevent suicide. Just as anyone in our community can be trained in CPR to help a person in medical need get to the professional help they need, QPR trains anyone in our community to help a person who is struggling with mental or emotional needs to get the professional help they need. Just as no one trained in CPR is expected to then preform open heart surgery, no one trained in QPR suicide prevention training is expected to become a mental health professional. However, those trained in QPR Suicide Prevention will be able to help save lives because they will learn to: recognize the warning signs of suicide, know how to offer hope, and know how to get professional help to save a life. In QPR, the general public is educated about the known warning signs of a suicide crisis and how to respond: expressions of hopelessness, depression, giving away prized possessions, talking of suicide, or securing lethal means.

As Wyoming communities, we need to approach the issue of suicide prevention in the same way ensuring that individuals throughout our community are trained in recognizing and referring those at risk of suicide. Because suicides happen in families – where emergency interventions are more likely to take place - we believe that AT LEAST ONE PERSON PER FAMILY UNIT should be trained in QPR. The training is free and open to the public, and we hope you will join us. Please be trained in suicide prevention - for your family, for your faith community, for your neighbors, and for your co-workers.




