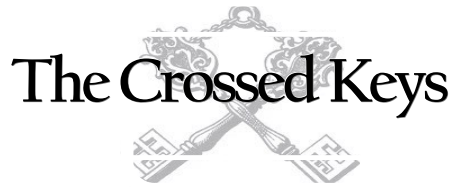

Go Deeper with the Gospel of Luke

Parish study for 2016

I want to take this opportunity to remind everyone about our parish study for the coming year as it features the Gospel of Luke that will begin on Jan. 10th. Let me just give you a few bullet points on this.

You do not need to commit to every single week to be a part of it. The nature of the study is that you can read the text and deal with the questions on your own if you cannot make a week. The study is designed for people to be able to weave in and out.

The purpose is ultimately to help us understand the life and teaching of Jesus better for us today. We will cover some context but application will be the goal.

You do not need the guide as the primarily text will be the Scriptures themselves. The guide will help bring out important points and give us discussion questions but the essential text is the Gospel of Luke itself.

Books are available for \$8 on the parish office if you want one.

Parent Liaisons are professionals who work with parents to help connect school and home, offer support and parenting advice, and assist in accessing community resources.

One of the community resources the Sheridan Parent Liaisons have discovered is St. Peter's outreach. Just before Christmas, elementary school staff identified families that could benefit from financial help to make their holidays better. With the support of St. Peter's, we provided gift cards to 19 families; a total of 64 parents and children. The amounts of the gift cards were small, but the impact was large.

Greetings,

I am writing to inform you of our Annual Meeting for 2016 and ask you to come and be a part of it. First let's get to the logistics - **The Annual Meeting for St. Peter's will be on Sunday January 31st. On that day there will be one service at 9am and we will have the meeting following the service.** It is important that we do this as there are matters we need to vote on as a congregation together, not as one service or the other. There will be food. The meeting and lunch should take 90 minutes.

### What the Annual Meeting is:

The Annual Meeting is a time for us to elect our leadership, present a budget, reflect on where we have been in the prior year, and change bylaws if need be. I do not anticipate any bylaw changes this year though.

**Electing Leadership** – In the Episcopal Church we are a Vestry led church in matters of administration and governance. (We strive to be led by the Holy Spirit in all matters.) The Vestry is the elected leadership of the church, and by electing them at the Annual Meeting you saying you trust them to make the best decisions for St. Peter's. This is a great honor and great responsibility and part of your duty to affirm them.

We also are electing delegates for Diocesan Convention who will represent this church in Diocesan matters for the coming year. This year the Convention is once again in Sheridan, so it is an easy travel year for someone wishing to be a delegate. Again these people are your representatives for the Diocese.

**Presenting a Budget** – The Vestry is responsible for preparing a budget for the church. The Annual Meeting is an opportunity for the congregation to weigh in on the budget, ask questions, offer feedback and comments.

**Ministry Reports** – The Annual Meeting also gives us a chance to reflect on what has been done over the past year so we are all on the same page. Let me give you an example: Did you know the Women of St. Peter's alone gave \$38,000 to Outreach causes? Do you know how they made that money? Do you know the Red Door (our parish thrift store) made \$26,000 last year that all went to Outreach?

Most importantly, it is a time to celebrate the past year at our parish and look forward to the next. We are wishing to be a delegate. Again these people are your representatives for the Diocese.

## Reintroducing St. Peter's Intercessory Prayer Chain

*First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all People. 1 Timothy 2:1*

### **What is a Prayer Chain?**

It is a group of people who are linked together like a chain, and committed to pray for other people in need. Prayer chain members are linked together, like a chain, to one another so that the needs for prayer can be passed on to all the members of the chain. When the request for prayer is received the coordinator notifies the prayer chain members by e-mail or phone; the members start praying immediately and continue to pray for the requested person daily for a specific time frame.

In an answer to prayer – a confidential email prayer chain is being reestablished at St. Peter's.

### **How to become involved?**

Any parishioner interested in praying for others' immediate and urgent needs is invited to contact Jodene Prusak; phone 307-752-7237 or e-mail [duffyprusak@gmail.com](mailto:duffyprusak@gmail.com) to join the Prayer Chain. No special skills are required other than a strong dedication to pray for others and the ability to refrain from gossiping.

This Prayer Chain is not replacing the printed prayer request in the Sunday Bulletin nor hospital visits carried out by Fr. John or Deacon Juanita; but rather to assist in providing additional opportunities for parishioner to receive prayers and to minister to others.

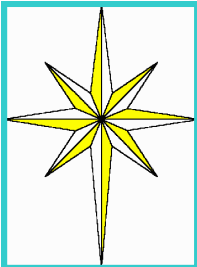

Greetings from Klaipeda.

“So don’t worry and don’t keep saying, ‘What shall we eat, what shall we drink or what shall we wear?! That is what pagans are always looking for; your Heavenly Father knows that you need them all. Set your heart on the kingdom and his goodness, and all these things will come to you as a matter of course.”

(Matthew 6:31-33, Phillips)

Yesterday we spent the afternoon with our friends Emas and Irma at their home in the country a few miles outside of Klaipeda. In the tumultuous days after Lithuania left the Soviet Union, Emas’s family was able to acquire a house and forty acres of land for very little money. He lives there now with his wife and their two young children, Urshule (2) and Agota (1) (Lithuanian versions of Ursula and Agatha). They are both alumni of LCC and have served at the university in various capacities. Emas presently works in admissions and spends much of his time traveling and speaking to high school students, challenging them to think about the important questions of life—while also giving some publicity to the school. You might have read my blog post about Saltshaker. Emas is basically in charge of that event, and both he and Irma have been involved since its inception.

I wanted to write just a bit about this family since their life is an illustration of the truth contained in the verse quoted above and might serve as an encouragement to you—I know it does to me. They live a very simple life on very little income. Irma doesn’t presently work (she is home with the kids) and Emas earns 600 euro a month (\$647). He told me about how many young people have left Lithuania to have a higher standard of living elsewhere. It is easy to leave for Scandinavia, Germany, or England and double one’s income. It is a powerful draw that few resist. The unfortunate side effect is a rapidly shrinking population that has lost 6% just the last 5 years. But they are committed to staying here in order to minister to young people.

For them their focus shapes the way they live as a family. They have a very open home where they are constantly welcoming friends and future friends for food, conversation, and rest in a tranquil setting. They are also building youth camp facilities on their property with the dream of eventually being a place where kids from all over the country can come in the summers for Christian community and encouragement. They have so built a couple small buildings and hope soon to complete a bath house and a larger structure for indoor meeting and eating space. You might wonder how all this happens on \$647 a month (this is a much poorer country than the US, but even for here this is very little money). Their answer is simple: they rely upon God and he brings in what they need as they need it. Sometimes money is given for materials; they have had a few groups who have come to help do work (including an enthusiastic and competent group of Germans who spent a week last summer). Sometimes even food shows up. As we enjoyed roasted lamb yesterday, Emas explained that a neighbor gave an entire lamb to them recently. The neighbor said he had been blessed by God with many lambs and wanted to give away a tenth of his animals in gratitude.

This way of life is a challenge to me and, I think, a challenge to the sort of life we take for granted in the US. “How strange it would be,” Emas said, “to live a life where your resources are devoted to your own life and your enjoyment!” And why would that be strange? It is, after all, perfectly normal. Yes, but it is not what we are made for. And, consequently, it is not the way of life that leads to greatest fulfillment. Jesus said it is better to give than receive. Why do we often find that so hard to believe?
